We are indeed connected to one another...

This month's cover with the Bishop of Southeast Florida and the Class of 2011 reminds us that we do not perform ministry in a vacuum. The Bishop does not only provide a connection to us from Trinity Cathedral, Miami, but also from each one of the other seventy-nine congregations within our Diocese.

It is not an accident that there is no word "Congregational" within the title of "The Episcopal Church", for we at All Saints' Church must abide by the canons (church law) of the Diocese and the rest of the 110 dioceses of the Episcopal Church.


We are intentional in the decision to omit from our title the word "Convention", for we are a Church who is a vital part of the one, holy Catholic and apostolic Church.

Our title, "Episcopal" is derived from the Greek word "bishop" and we do not apologize for the fact that we look toward our bishops for leadership. Every time a bishop is elected in one of the 110 dioceses, he or she must be approved by a majority of the representatives of the laity and the clergy in the companion dioceses of the United States. Such action underscores our connection to one another.

Does this connection end at the coast lands of the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans? Not at all, for the Episcopal Church is part of the nearly 80 million Anglicans throughout the world. Indeed, Anglicanism is the second most comprehensive religious body within Christianity in the world.

Our Anglican Communion goes one step further. We are an ecumenical Church and therefore we are in continual dialogue with our Roman Catholic and Orthodox sisters and brothers, as well as our Protestant relatives. It may appear to be a bit late, but we Anglicans are beginning conversations with our Jewish, Muslim and other religious colleagues in this century.

I'm glad we are connected with so many other folk. It makes life interesting, conversation stimulating and mutual ministry effective! I pray that the connection will grow in the years ahead.

## DIACONATE CANDIDATE REPORT

The letter from the Bishop arrived on October 15, the day of the Art Festival. Of course, I was quite elated to know that after waiting almost a full month that the Commission on Ministry recommended to the Bishop that I was approved to be a postulant for the Diaconate and was assured of the Bishop's full support. My status has changed but I still have a long way to go to officially become an actual candidate for ordination. I still continue to do most of the same things that I have been doing. I need to work on developing a bridge ministry which I have started doing by assisting the Rev. Donna Hall in her work at three nursing homes, Parkway in Stuart, The Manors in Hobe Sound and Clarebridge in Tequesta. I am still so impressed with all that she does especially with those who have dementia. The people that she visits and for whom she has worship services with Communion are so responsive to her caring, her assurance of God's continuing love for them. They just love what she provides for them and it is such a privilege to be a part of this by singing all the old hymns, reading from the lectionary and saying prayers of healing.

I have also reached out to George Kinnard, Deacon at Church of the Advent, and hope to be approved to spend time with him at the State Prison where he is the chaplain.

I continue with all my classes at the Diocesan School, have given my first full sermon there yesterday based on the texts for the first Sunday of Advent which I hope to share with you at the Church services on Sunday November 27. Keep me in your prayers as I prepare to do this and to write 3 more sermons for my homiletics class. Bill Winseman and I continue to travel to St Mark's in Oakland Park every other Saturday. It is great to have his company on these trips and to share with each other about our respective backgrounds and plans for future ministries.

I continue to do pastoral care for all of our parishioners who have been identified to me as having serious pastoral care needs. Please continue to advise me of anyone who is either acutely ill in the hospital, in rehab care or is unable to get to church and I will make every effort to reach out to them and try to make sure that they still feel a part of our wonderful community here at All Saints'. I also continue to administer the TRUE fund which, as you all probably know, provides small amounts of financial assistance to those in need of emergency financial help to pay for critical services such as utility bills or rent. Again if you can help with this by giving some of your money to this fund, it would help some very needy people a great deal in these stressful economic times.

Finally, I would like to remind people that I plan to do another Advent Study group starting on Thursday December 1 at 7PM in Houg Hall and for the next two Thursdays at the same time. The theme will be "*The Stillness We Seek*" based on a booklet of daily advent meditations written by the Rev. Cathy George of Dorchester, Ma. I hope many of you will come out for this as I think those who came last year found it helpful for them as they prepared for Christmas and celebrating Christ's Incarnation.

## Peering Into the Past

In last month's column I wrote a bit about our former Jr. Warden & Stuart Mayor—" [Theodore Dehon] His great grandfather, the Rt. Rev. Theodore Dehon, had been confirmed by Bishop Samuel Seabury and was ordained as the 2<sup>nd</sup> Bishop of the Diocese of South Carolina by among others, Bishop William White.]

Forgive me, I should have explained what was so significant about these two bishops. Below find a compilation of notes on the lives of these men, both on our church calendar from *Biographical sketches of memorable Christians of the past* by James E. Kiefer

Samuel Seabury (November 30, 1729 – February 25, 1796) was the first American Episcopal bishop, the second Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church, USA, and the first Bishop of Connecticut. He had been a leading Loyalist in New York City during the American Revolution."

A crucial date for members of the Episcopal Church in the United States of America is the consecration of the first Bishop of the Anglican Communion in the United States. During the colonial era, there had been no Anglican bishops in the New World; and persons seeking to be ordained as clergy had had to travel to England for the purpose. After the achievement of American independence, it was important for the Church in the United States to have its own bishops, and an assembly of Connecticut clergy chose Samuel Seabury to go to England and there seek to be consecrated as a bishop.

However, the English bishops were forbidden by law to consecrate anyone who would not take an oath of allegiance to the British Crown. He accordingly turned to the Episcopal Church of Scotland, which had no connection with the government and was accordingly free to consecrate him without political complications.

In Aberdeen, Scotland on 14 November 1784 he was ordained a Bishop and is commemorated on the church calendar on that date.

The Most Reverend William White (1748 – 1836) was the first and fourth Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church, USA (1789; 1795–1836), consecrated at Lambeth Palace in England he became the first Bishop of the Diocese of Pennsylvania (1787–1836), and the second United States Senate Chaplain (appointed December 9, 1790). White was largely responsible for the Constitution of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America. At his suggestion, the system of church government was established more or less as we have it today. He is commemorated on the church calendar

Think about how small and primitive Jensen was in the 1930s. So while the former Mayor of Stuart, Theodore was the great great grandson of Bishop Theodore Dehon, our little parish's faith history spans the generations – That is why I found the story note worthy and I hope you did too.

### Altar Flowers

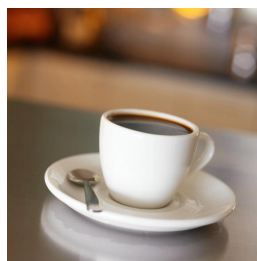

## The Story of "Joy to the World"

The Christmas season would not be complete without singing *Joy to the World*, the most joyous of the Christmas carols. Ironically, the author of the hymn, Isaac Watts, never intended it to be a Christmas carol. It was actually a part of his *Psalms of David Imitated*, which was published in 1719, which was comprised of paraphrases of much of the Psalms in New Testament language.

*Joy to the World* is the story of the author, Isaac Watts (1675-1748), who is considered to be "The Father of English Hymnody". He deserves the title, not only because he wrote the first English hymns, but because he gave impetus to hymnody and established its place in English Church worship.

Congregational singing had been strictly limited to the Psalms of the Old Testament in poetic form for more than one hundred years. Some of these Psalms rhymed so unnaturally that Samuel Wesley, labeled them to be "scandalous doggerel," and many shared his opinion.

*Joy to the World* is inspired by the final half of Psalm 98. The author changed the old Jewish psalm of praise for a historic deliverance into a Christian song of praise for the salvation of God that began to be when the Babe of Bethlehem came "to make his blessing flow far as the curse is found." The tune to the song is attributed to George Frederick Handel and has similarities to phrases of his great oratorio, *Messiah*. Notably the first four tones match the beginning of the chorus, "Lift Up Your Heads."

*Joy to the world, the Lord is come!  
Let earth receive her King;  
Let every heart prepare Him room,  
And heaven and nature sing,  
And heaven and nature sing,  
And heaven, and heaven, and nature sing.*

*Joy to the world, the Savior reigns!  
Let men their songs employ;  
While fields and floods, rocks, hills and plains  
Repeat the sounding joy,  
Repeat the sounding joy,  
Repeat, repeat, the sounding joy.*

*No more let sins and sorrows grow,  
Nor thorns infest the ground;  
He comes to make His blessings flow  
Far as the curse is found,  
Far as the curse is found,  
Far as, far as, the curse is found.*

*He rules the world with truth and grace,  
And makes the nations prove  
The glories of His righteousness,  
And wonders of His love,  
And wonders of His love,  
And wonders, wonders, of His love.*

## Only One Eucharist on Thanksgiving Day

The clergy of the “three small churches of Martin County” have determined that in 2011 the congregations will not host an evening Holy Eucharist on the Eve of Thanksgiving Day. Many of the participants at the Convention were Saints from All Saint's Church. Mike McCoy, Karen Phillips Smith, Bill Smith and Jan Rajki served as delegates or alternates, and were joined by the Rector and Jean Ann Hendricks. Assisting them were Edd Bymne, Alan Gellert and Bill Winsman.

A resolution discouraging the release of balloons at worship services passed, as the Convention had concerns that wildlife might be endangered by the deflated balloons. Several resolutions on addressing the budget were sent to committees and another resolution addressing issues of death and dying were passed.

The membership of the Convention required the attendees to sit at round tables in the school's gymnasium, which was converted into a lovely banquet scene on Friday night. The preacher at the Holy Eucharist was the Suffragan Bishop of the Armed Forces.
