I love ministering in an historic setting! To be able to see a church building, over one hundred years old, enhanced with a new stained glass window, is a delight. The church building of All Saints' was created in the nineteenth century and the Celeste Alvarez Memorial Window is being added in the twenty-first century. There is a sense of continuity over the centuries which I deeply appreciate.


When I began my ordained ministry as a Curate, I served a Tidewater Virginia church established in 1761. Traveling to Upstate New York, I was blessed to serve a parish begun in 1810. Arriving here in South Florida, at the turn of this century, I served a West Palm Beach congregation which is over a hundred years old.

It is not the building or window per se, but, rather, the symbolism of the decades and centuries these items represent. Many times, when I lead tourists into All Saints' Church, I hear the response, "You can feel the years of prayer in this building". I believe they are correct. The faith of men and women who travel to South Florida is deeply embedded into the fabric of our parish church.

The same can be said about our liturgy, dearly held by Anglicans. Beyond our prayer books of 1549, the prayers and actions of our worship extend to centuries long before our prayer books were translated into English.

The Lenten rite of washing feet follows our Lord's action of the first century. Standing at the foot of the cross and hearing the Seven Last Words is an action which is hundreds of years old. Gathering at the Conklin Cross to light the Paschal Fire was begun by our Lord's disciples, over two thousand years ago!

I encourage you to join us on the Sunday when Bishop Said blesses and dedicates our newest window. I also welcome you to the centuries old worship services of this Lenten season and Eastertide. These events are offered to the glory of God and benefit each and every one of us.

### **Pastoral Care/Diaconate Candidate Report**

The Discernment Committee for me had its first meeting on Sunday March 20 in Coffee Hall. In addition to the lay members of the Committee, 9 from All Saints and two from St. Monica's, Father Frisby and Father Chip Stokes of St Paul's, Delray were invited. I ask for your continuing prayers as I enter this phase of the process of becoming a Deacon. I know I have the support of our congregation as you have told to me. Thanks.

I continue with my courses at the Diocesan School until April 16 when we have our last class for this academic year. This next month will be very stressful for me as I complete my course work for these classes. There will be two very comprehensive exams in Church History from the Reformation until the present day and one on the Old Testament including everything in it from after the Pentateuch to the end including all the Writings (Psalms, Proverbs, etc.) I have just completed writing a paper on Samuel Seabury, the Episcopal Church's first bishop which I enjoyed writing. It was enlightening to learn about the early Anglican and Episcopal Church in America. I have acquired so much knowledge not only about the history of our church, but also the development of the Book of Common Prayer and the liturgy of our church. I am now working on a paper on St Paul and the epistles for the New Testament class. Thanks to Arlene Bruttell for providing me with a new book on Paul to help me with this. I continue with the Old Testament Class in which we are now studying about chapters of the Bible written by the Major and Minor Prophets.

I was the officiant for our Morning Prayer Service last week, about which I was very nervous, but with a few errors did reasonably well. My presentation on Hildegard for the Spirituality Class went very well I thought. She was such a remarkable woman. I am still working on developing my Rule of Life with the help of Deacon Carol and Allison Spencer, my Spiritual Advisor.

With all of this I am trying to do Pastoral Care by reaching out to those in need from our church and bringing Communion to them as are others I know, especially Janet Kempf. One of our members, Gertrude Wescott died this month. I was seeing her regularly at the hospital and in hospice. She was buried in our cemetery on Wed. March 9 with a graveside service done by Father Frisby. Thanks to all of you who are so attentive to the needs of all our members and their families.

### **Music Notes**

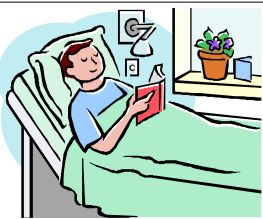

For three hours, you are invited to listen to the reflections of the Seven Last Words of Christ on the Cross, by neighboring clergy of the community. You may enter or depart depending on your schedule. Between each "Word", there will be prayers said and a hymn sung

## **Easter Day, April 24 6:30 am—Sunrise Service**

We begin our joyful celebration of the Resurrection with the first Eucharist of Easter at the Conkling Cross, facing the water and the rising sun.



## **8:00 AM - EASTER DAY**

The 8:00 a.m. Holy Eucharist will not be accompanied by the organ and will be following an Easter Morning Coffee Hour after the service. The quiet of the morning and the scent of lilies are offered during this service of Holy Communion.

## **10:00AM - EASTER DAY**

Our Senior Choir and Organist/Choir Director will lead us in worship with their excellent music, as the children bedeck the "Mite Box Cross" with flowers. After the children "discover" the buried "Alleluias", we shall all receive communion and then join the children for the festivities in the garden. The glorious celebration of our lives together in the Risen Christ will begin a fifty-day season of explosive joy.

## Peering into the Past

**One hundred years ago** – In framed newspaper clippings in Houg Hall and in the parish service book, two priests are listed as having served All Saints. The Rev. Vincent C. Lacey, 1909-1911 is not recorded as having performed funerals, baptisms or confirmations. However, newspaper articles, found on line, from the pages of “The Ft. Pierce News” report him performing a wedding at St. Andrew’s, Ft. Pierce and in the April 8, edition he’s holding services “... Jensen Waveland, 3:30; Walton at 6:30 p.m....”<sup>[i]</sup> One would reasonably expect that he recorded the services where he officiated and being recorded at St. Andrews.

Another priest listed is the Rev. Stephen F. Reade, Oct. 1911- 1912. The service records document his provision of sacramental services from March 12, 1912 – January 8, 1922.

Taped into “The Canonical Church Register for Missions” and marked The REV. STEPHEN F. READE CELEBRATES TENTH ANNIVERSARY AT EPISCOPAL CHURCH --- The Rev. Stephen F. Reade, who came here from Grace Church, Georgetown, Texas, on the 29th of October, 1911, celebrated his tenth anniversary as Rector of St. Andrews Church, this city, on last Sunday...<sup>[ii]</sup>

“There will also be a celebration of Holy Communion at 10:30 a.m. Sunday, 26<sup>th</sup>, [November 1911] in All Saints church, Jensen-Waveland. “There will also be a celebration of Holy Communion at 10:30 a.m. Sunday, Dec. 24<sup>th</sup>, in All Saints church, Jensen-Waveland.”<sup>[iii]</sup> In 1912, S. F. Reade of St Andrews was providing clergy support and the congregation was 10.<sup>[iv]</sup> All Saints membership was 12 by 1915, and the Rev. Mr. Reade was continuing to increase the size of the congregation in Ft. Pierce. <sup>[v]</sup>

## Lenten Self-Denial Folder Envelope

Enclosed with this issue is a reminder envelope, where the Self-Denial Folder may be placed when returning it to the church. Quarters set aside during the Lenten season are used to supplement the annual budget. These quarters are often the result of the savings experienced by giving up desserts, candy, gum or cocktails.

## Mite Boxes Directed to Back Pack Lunches

While the adults direct the savings of their Lenten discipline to folders, children in the Church School place their offerings in a Mite Box, which is located on the wooden, white cross in the chancel. The proceeds will be directed to provide meal for children in Martin County during weekends. On Easter Morning, the students will decorate the cross with flowers, known for many years as "The Flowering of the Cross", an attempt to turn an ugly instrument of death into a beautiful statement of the Resurrection.

## Being Prepared to Face Our Own Death

This month's issue of The Trumpet includes burial directions for members of the households of All Saints' Church, provided by Episcopal Charities of Southeast Florida. These directions are not meant to frighten or disturb anyone, but, rather, to alleviate the decisions loved ones have to make during the time of one's death. If decisions are made before sickness and death, much grief is avoided. Please return these forms to the church.



## FROM THE NURSES' DESK

### Osteoarthritis

There are many forms of arthritis but the most common is osteoarthritis and it is one of the major causes of disability. There is a gradual deterioration of the cartilage in the knees, hips, hands, shoulders, spine and many other joints in your body. There is no cure.

A major problem in the knees and hips is pain etc. on weight bearing joints which can affect the person's quality of life with unsteady gait, fear of falling, insomnia, depression and loss of involvement in activities of daily living.

Treatment includes PT/OT, light aerobic and water exercises, weight loss and the use of anti-inflammatory medications to reduce pain with the emphasis on using the lowest dose possible. There are topical creams, injection of cortisone, herbal remedies, use of TENS unit, acupuncture and chiropractic manipulation. You may need to use assistive devices in walking for safety and make other modifications in your home. When all of these conservative measures fail, surgery is indicated.

I am well acquainted with knee/ hip replacement and also an ankle fusion. These were all related to a fall and trauma to multiple joints. These surgical procedures are not easy but the results are well worth it with the reduction in pain. As the years have passed, there has been much improvement in the surgery, recuperation and long term outcome. The replacements may last 10 years or longer.

One latest development is a less invasive knee procedure called MAKOplasty which is resurfacing the bones of the knee robotically. This results in no bone loss, smaller incision and may be done as an outpatient. Time will tell if this is an alternative short term answer and does leave the option for a total knee replacement in the future.

I would be glad to answer any questions about my orthopedic surgeries and experiences.

## SYNOPSIS OF FEBRUARY VESTRY MEETING

The Vestry meeting opened at 6:30 pm with prayer by the Rector who asked the Vestry to remember the soul of Bill Winseman's father who died earlier in the day.

Minutes of the January meeting were approved, as was the February Financial Report.

The Vestry approved the soliciting of specific bids to do the repairs necessary to replace rotting wood and deteriorating siding on the church.

Arpad Rajki reported the financial review on the Cemetery was ongoing and the Vestry elected Arpad as the liaison to the Cemetery Board.

Doug Ell asked the Vestry to take no action on Amendments to the Cemetery By-Laws taken at the Cemetery Annual Meeting until after a Vestry Committee could meet members of the Cemetery Board. The Vestry agreed and appointed John Brown, Dick LaQuerre, Arpad Rajki and Doug Ell to meet with the members of the Cemetery Board.

Father Hendricks said he is still opposed to publishing election results in the Trumpet because he strongly opposes hurting anyone's feelings.

A Vestry member asked that a job description be written for the position of Parish Secretary. The Rector reminded all that he alone is responsible for hiring the position and the Vestry is responsible for salary and benefits.

The ECW President reported the ECW has approved a benefit for Hibiscus House, but felt the Winter Wonderland project would be too much work for the women to undertake this year. The Vestry asked the ECW to reconsider the date of Winter Wonderland.

A motion was made and approved that future projects involving fund raising be submitted first to a guild or committee of the church and that future fund raising requests from individuals be submitted to and approved by the Vestry.

Vestry Retreat postponed until April because of too many activities in March.

The Vestry approved and signed the Parochial Report for submission to the Diocesan office.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:20 pm.
