Clarifying the Words Of the Gospel

The Feast of the Epiphany, 2011

Beloved in Christ,

Our Heavenly Creator made each one of us truly unique, different from anyone else! We see differently, we have different tastes, and we hear differently. Indeed, when speaking, we have different levels and volumes of speech. When we are in a public place, such as a sanctuary of a church, we need to amplify the space, so all are able to see. The flowers in the vases are larger than most bouquets, the “holy table” is larger than most tables, and the candlesticks are pronounced.

Such amplification includes the sound system. Even though All Saints’ Church is perceived as “a little church” with a seating capacity of 180, the words of scripture, the psalm, and the sermon need to be amplified. Thanks to the generosity of Bart Cleveland, we have a new sound system. We are still “fine tuning” the system, but it is a marked improvement to our previous sound system, which some say is three decades old.


The Good News of Jesus Christ needs amplification in other ways. Telling others about our Lord and His Church may require repeated statements. If you have invited a neighbor or friend who does not attend a church, and you have been turned down, do not hesitate to extend a second invitation to an event held at All Saints’.

Sometimes the individual you are inviting has been hurt by a previous church experience, so I encourage you to be patient and kind to such an individual. Inviting them to a dinner or social event at All Saints’ may be the best way to introduce them to the knowledge of the Lord.

Words need not be spoken continually. Handing a written invitation or sharing a flyer might be just as effective. Introducing them to the web-site is another opportunity.

A gift of a book or a segment of the bible shared to an individual who is inactive in church life has proven to be a terrific entrance into Christianity. Be imaginative in the selection of sharing the Good News of Christ.

The season of Epiphany is the missionary season of the Church. Enjoy the amplification of All Saints’ sound system and join in other forms of amplifying the Good News!

Peering Into the Past —Legacies

If you have attended All Saints' Episcopal Church for more than a year, you most likely have heard of the LeDuc Scholarship Fund. Henry Sumner LeDuc was born 25 Nov 1884 in the District of Columbia. On 30 December, 1918, Florence Adelaide Ormsbee married him. He was a draftsman & mechanical engineer for Buick Motor Co. Mr. LeDuc was one of those listed on the church's original charter when it was filed in 1958, with the Clerk of the Circuit Court of Martin County. He and his wife wintered here for 18 years, staying in Ocean Breeze Park, Jensen Beach, FL. They were regular attendees at the 11 a.m. service though never members recorded in our parish register. They were on the books in an Episcopal parish in Flint, MI. Henry died 5 April, 1971. His legacy lives on through the students, whose college education was funded in part through the scholarship funds provided.

John Emmet Seery and his wife are listed in the first parish register as members. In March 1931 she wrote her will. Elizabeth Seery died of tuberculosis and was buried in the All Saints' Cemetery in November, along with her two husbands, who preceded her in death. Her recorded will documents she left \$5,000 for a trust to provide for the perpetual care of her "cemetery lot #55, in All Saints' Church Cemetery, in Jensen, Florida." The funds could be turned over to the trustees of All Saints Cemetery and any funds in excess of the money needed in any given year could be used to beautify "the general grounds of All Saints' Church Cemetery." At that time the church and cemetery were one entity. Some surviving treasurer's reports show that funds were used in the 1940's to help support the church.

Meeting With Bishop Frade

My first meeting with the Bishop took place on Wednesday January 12, 2011 at 10:30 am. This is the next step in my long process of becoming a deacon. I met with him in his office in Miami at his suggestion, so I would have a chance to also see the Cathedral. It's a long drive which took me two and a half hours, but I got confused at one point on Rte 95 and got off on 87A rather than 87B because logically I thought A came before B, but not on 95S and I have very little experience with driving in the big City of Miami.

The meeting seemed to go very well. He listened carefully to what I had to say about my calling to become a deacon and offered whatever support he could give. He seemed encouraging and felt that good deacons were a very important part of the church's four ministries which consist of the episcopacy, the priesthood, the diaconate and the laity. He asked if I had any questions for him and described that he considered this to be a dialogue of mutual sharing. I told him I had no real questions at this time.

We discussed the long process involved in my discernment and preparation and I made a commitment to continue in the process with God's help. I brought my partner Edd with me and shared with him about civil union in New Jersey and that we had a formal blessing and celebration at our former church with two clergy there. The Bishop introduced himself to Edd after our interview.

I think the next step in the process is the formation of a parish discernment committee which hopefully will be set up fairly soon and have several meetings when a further recommendation will be made to the Archdeacon about my continuation in the diaconate process.

I passed all four of my courses in the Diocesan School, two with grades of High pass. It is a pass-fail curriculum. There are no letter or numerical grades. I start my second semester courses again on 1/15, taking the second half of all four courses I took the first semester, Spiritual Journey II, Old Testament from Joshua to the end, Church History starting with the Reformation including the history of the Episcopal Church and New Testament/Letters of Paul.

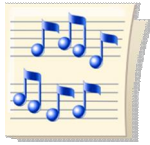

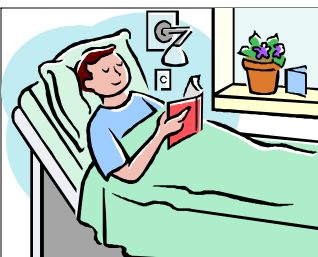

Synopsis of Vestry Meeting, November 15, 2010

- Conferred with Arlene Bruttell, Cemetery Board Clerk, on matters of the All Saints' Cemetery.
- Received the Stewardship Report that reflected 91 pledges totaling \$190,167. Approximately thirty households who pledged last year have yet to pledge.
- Applauded the news that Arpad Radjki has joined the Finance Committee
- Discussed the possibility of placing hand sanitation devices on church property
- Thanked John Leighliter for agreeing to review the engineer's report from the Diocese
- Applauded the news that the swings behind the Thrift Shop have been removed
- Thanked Doug Ell for donating a new digital piano for the choir loft.
- Received the Diocesan 2011 assessment of \$33,794. There is an increase from 13% to 14.8% by the Diocese.
- Heard the request from the Rector that after two years of a frozen salary, the Choir Director should receive a salary increase for 2011. The Finance Committee will take the request under advisement.
- Received the Clergy Compensation Guidelines passed by Convention. It reflected a \$700 increase in the Rector's salary. The Finance Committee will take the resolution under advisement.
- Resolved to authorize the Junior Warden to negotiate with Basket Cases Catering and the use of the Houg Hall kitchen
- Accepted a project proposal from Bart Cleveland to update the sound system in the church
- Congratulated the Junior Warden upon her election as Fourth Lay Deputy to the General Convention of the Church, to be held in Indianapolis in 2012. The Rector was elected Second Clergy Alternate Deputy
- Rejoiced to hear that 22 individuals have signed up to attend the Thanksgiving Dinner, which will follow the Holy Eucharist on Thanksgiving morning.

SAVE YOUR PAPER FOR RECYCLING

Office Supplies & Kitchen Supplies

Bulletins, newsletters, correspondence and the general business of the church require many varied office supplies to include paper of all sizes, scotch tape, pens, envelopes, etc. Sunday coffee hours, meetings, fellowship gatherings and other events in Houg Hall require a lot of paper goods and kitchen supplies, especially plates, cups, napkins, paper towels, dishwasher soap, coffee, etc.

Dara has updated the list that is posted in Houg Hall and if you are able to donate any items to either the office or the kitchen you will be saving our church the cost of these supplies and thus allowing us to use that money to perhaps continue to maintain or improve our beautiful church or even help fund a ministry.

Altar Flowers

The Flowers in the Sanctuary each week beautify the altar and glorify the Lord, as they offer thanksgiving for a life, past or present. Parishioners may donate altar flowers for a special occasion, a memorial, a thanksgiving, or in honor of birthdays, weddings, anniversaries, and other special occasions such as an offering to God's Glory. Parishioners may sign up on the Flower Chart or call the office. A minimum donation of \$35.00 is suggested. After the service, the flowers will be delivered to a member of the parish who might not be able to attend the service.

Leduc Scholarship Outreach Off and Running

The Leduc Scholarship Committee has received 76 applications from Jensen Beach High School students for the 2011-2012 college year. With over \$360,000 in our fund, the committee will begin reviewing these, narrowing the list, scheduling interviews, and then deciding on the number and amount of scholarships. Last year we awarded four \$2,500 scholarships

We are pleased to welcome Wanda Beymer and her expertise to the committee. Wanda has a personal interest in this outreach.

The committee met on December 14th. Since 2003, when the committee was formally organized, we have awarded \$50,000 in scholarships. An additional \$35,000 in awards was made between 1997 and 2003. Prior to that time, over \$250,000 in loans were made to students.

The fund has also received \$91,000 over the past fifteen years from the Gladys Waaler fund, part of the Martin County Community Foundation. Ms. Waaler, widow of Reider Waaler, died in 1993 at the age of 92. We are attempting to get more information on this generous lady. Any help would be appreciated.

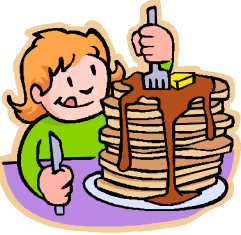
