Tabulating the Long Range Planning Survey

The Feast of the Holy Cross, 2011

Beloved in Christ,

This month's cover of *The Trumpet* reminds us of the conscientious work of the members of the Long Range Planning Committee. This is the first such group of planners since the anticipated departure of the Rev. Tom Ryan, sixth Rector of All Saints' Church, in 2003.


Planning is vital, for otherwise chaos reigns! When a Christian plans, he or she turns to the Church, which points to a document entitled, "A Rule of Life". Many take advantage of the Benedictine model used by monasteries and convents within the Church. The individual Christian promises God certain actions, such as worship attendance, exercise, and reading scripture. It is a good idea to review A Rule of Life periodically, so that one discovers if the agreement with God is too lax or too unrealistic.

Within the church community, the Vestry meets annually to plan for the year at the Annual Vestry Retreat at the beginning of the secular year. Members of the Vestry also meet at the end of the year to conduct a mutual ministry review of the clergy, staff and Vestry. So, the beginning of the year, as well as the end of the year, involves review and study. In addition, the Vestry pauses quarterly to evaluate how they are progressing in their goals.

The eighty churches of the Diocese of Southeast Florida are also involved in planning, as reflected in the semi-annual gathering of the Convocation, the monthly meetings of clergy at the Clericus and the annual meeting of Diocesan Convention. These gatherings assist the congregations in articulating their goals.

Finally, the entire Church of over 110 dioceses meets every three years to study, review, budget and plan for the health of the Church. Next year, the Episcopal Church will meet in Indianapolis for over a week as each Diocese will include deputies of four priests and four lay members.

Sound like a lot of meetings? You bet, but it illustrates Christianity's desire to be organized and attentive to the wishes of the Holy Spirit.

The All Saints' Executive Committee

Many Vestries in the Episcopal Church establish an Executive Committee to assist the Vestry. "In traditional English practice, the rector and wardens are the vestry. The simplest Executive Committee might be constituted the same way. Some parishes might wish to add two or three chairpersons of key committees." (1)

"Some parishes establish the Executive Committee in their parish by-laws and may also give it specific authority to act between meetings of the Vestry." (1)

"A properly constituted Executive Committee, meeting at regular intervals and reporting to the Vestry, can make all the difference in the way the vestry is able to carry out its work." (1)

The members of the All Saints Executive Committee are the Rector, the Wardens, the Treasurer, the Assistant Treasurer and the Stewardship Chair. The committee meets on the second Monday of the month, one week prior to the Vestry Meeting to prepare the items to be listed on the agenda for the upcoming Vestry meeting. The committee has also been charged by the Vestry to take appropriate action as needed if an emergency should arrive. The Vestry limits spending for each emergency event to \$150.00. The vestry also passed a resolution in the spring of 2011 that the Executive Committee is charged with the approval of any and all new ministries and activities.

Peering Into the Past

Eighty (80) years ago, in the Ft Pierce paper on Friday, October 30, 1931 a headline read:
“ALL SAINTS WILL HAVE A PASTOR THROUGH WINTER”

“All Saints Episcopal church at Waveland, will have a rector this winter. Rev. Dr. G. L. G. Thomas will arrive next Thursday, bringing his wife and three children with him. They will live in the Horace Atwood houses on West Fourth Street.

Theodore Dehon said this morning, Dr. Thomas will be here until next May, at least, and possibly longer. He served the church last March and April, and was so well liked by the congregation that the latter is now very desirous of securing him as a permanent pastor.

Last July and August, Dr. Thomas served a congregation at West Palm Beach, and later has supplied in a Tampa pastorate, preaching in both places with marked success. He is still a young man, and seems assured of a promising career.

Dr. Thomas will preach at All Saints’ next Sunday morning.”

In the Service Record Book, in the hand of G.L. Thomas is written, “Beginning Sunday evening Nov. 8th, 1931 at 7:30 p.m. services commenced at Parish House in Stuart”. Later that winter season, makes this annotation: “On Friday evening, January 22nd, 1932 at 7:30 P.M. Bishop Wing dedicated the Stuart Parish House, naming it St. Mary’s Church, Stuart. From now on, therefore, there will be separate books for St. Mary’s although until I buy a register from Morehouse Publishing Co. (or elsewhere) I shall continue to use this present book.”

And so the daughter parish was born...

Diaconate Candidate Report

I am writing this on Sunday September 11, the 10 year anniversary of the terrorist attacks on our country, and reflecting back on that terrible day that we all will never forget - its tragedy and the way we all pulled together to help one another and were one in our love for our country and its greatness. It's trite to say, but I will reiterate, May God truly continue to bless the United States of America.

Yesterday Bill Winseman and I traveled 83 miles south to St. Mark's, Oakland Park, to attend the first day of classes at the Diocesan School. It was great to have Bill's company in this adventure and he drove. Of course, I will drive next time. He is taking all the same classes that I took last year and seems to have the same enthusiasm as I had after the first day of classes there. It is a small school, but we have excellent instructors and I think it is equivalent to any college/graduate level program at any seminary or university.

I have 4 challenging courses again, the first course is Diakonia and Lay Ministry taught by the wonderful Rev. Mimi Howard whom I had last year for the Old Testament course. This course should really help me to know what it means to be a deacon in the Episcopal Church. The second course is Homiletics, which I know Father Frisby is glad to hear, as I may now be able to do homilies at All Saints'. This course is being taught by the School's new director the Rev. William Stomski who replaces the beloved Father Perry Fuller who died this summer(Father Perry's wife Pam has agreed to continue as the School's Administrator and she is a wonderful person in her own right). I know I will learn a lot from this course about sermon preparation. We are already asked to write an introduction for a sermon on any Bible verse of our own choosing. Each class is 1 1/2 hours and the day starts with Morning Prayer.

After the first two classes, we have a break for lunch of an hour and return for our afternoon classes. My first afternoon class is very heavy. It's called Basic Systematic Theology and is taught by Maggie Kreuzberger. She appears to be a very knowledgeable person in this field and I'm sure I will learn a lot about theology which is the study of God who is beyond our ability to really fully comprehend. Finally my last class is called Pastoral Theology taught by The Rev. Dr. Lisa Barraclough, a Canadian and chaplain at St Mark's School in Palm Beach Gardens. This will be an enjoyable and practical class in which I will develop more skills in doing pastoral care. I think this is going to be an exciting and challenging academic year for me.

Many of you probably know that, on September 16, I will have a meeting with the Commission on Ministry at the Duncan Center for them to decide about whether I have met the criteria to become a postulant for becoming a Deacon. All of the paperwork is completed and now I will meet with them in person in an all day process along with Edd, my spouse and Father Frisby. I know I have all of your blessings in this process and I hope for a positive outcome that I will be accepted to be a postulant, but I know and trust God and will accept whatever is decided and know it is for the best.

I continue to do my work as the Pastoral Care Coordinator and appreciate all that you do to support this ministry. All of us at All Saints' do pastoral care with all of our members and even with others in our community and families. I also continue to coordinate the TRUE Fund and have met with several people who have very significant financial problems and have given them some help from our fund, but the needs are great and our ability to meet these needs are very limited.

Finally I want to say that I am planning another Advent Study this Fall, probably starting on Thurs. Dec. 8th at 7 o'clock and going for three weeks for about an hour and a half. I plan to use another booklet published by Forward Movement called Stillness We Seek : Daily Advent Meditations by Cathy George, a priest of St Mary's Episcopal Church in Dorchester, Ma. an inner city congregation. I hope all of you will plan to attend this study group.

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Once again, the Long-Range Planning Committee wishes to thank everyone for the enthusiastic response to our second, and final, survey seeking input from the entire congregation about current conditions at All Saints. A total of 68 parishioners responded with their level of agreement to a series of statements under the broad categories of outreach, Christian education, church finances, and communication.

A detailed report of the survey's results is available in the church office to any who may wish to read it. For the purposes of this letter, however, I will highlight the most significant findings.

In the area of outreach, there is strong support for both the congregation and the administration to continuously seek out and accept new members that reflect the diversity and vitality of the current members of the church. There is also a desire to focus our outreach efforts on underprivileged groups both within the church and in our immediately surrounding communities.

There is broad and enthusiastic support for Christian education of all types at All Saints', but especially for our youth. The strongest response we received among all the statements was in support of Sunday school. That was followed closely by support for a Youth Ministry.

The overall message about church finances is, be prudent with our limited resources but be wise and plan carefully for the future. There is very strong support for the establishment of a reserve fund for long-term capital improvements, and for the creation of a master plan for the church campus.

Finally, in the area of communications, there is agreement that All Saints' should do more to promote the church and our many events and activities. And there continues to be significant polarization about the quantity and quality of communications from the church administration. Most of those who responded to the survey were either very satisfied or very dissatisfied with formal communications.

The Committee's plan now is to take these results and use them as the basis for creating a series of goals and objectives for the church to pursue. We will continue to report our findings and activities to the Vestry at their monthly meetings, to which you are all invited. We will also continue to solicit your input and feedback as we proceed. We very much want our efforts to reflect your hopes and aspirations for All Saints. To that end, please feel free to contact any member of the Long-Range Planning Committee at any time, for any reason. Our final report will be presented at the annual membership meeting in January.

Thank you once again for your highly valued participation in the process of creating a plan that enhances the sustainability and vitality of the church we all so dearly love.

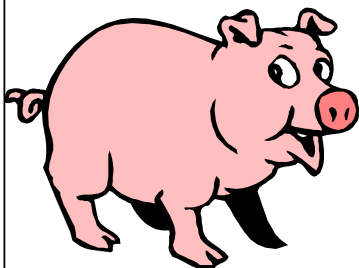

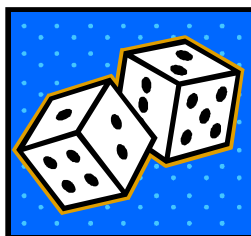

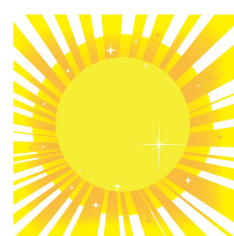
